Meeting Times: 10:00 am-3:00 pm

### **SEPTEMBER 10, 2005**

**Morning**: *Guild Library Work*, Members

Did you know that the Guild's library holds many hidden treasures? Our books cover basic to advanced techniques for weaving, spinning, macrame, fimo, and basket weaving, and many are autographed, out-of-print, or one-of-a-kind. Please come dressed to work on the Guild Library.

### Afternoon: Summer Wrap-up

We will have thoroughly discussions of activities from the summer including Scottish Festival, Craft Adventure, and NEWS. This is a great opportunity to ask questions and offer suggestions for program improvement as well as catch up on members' activities. This is always lively and informative. Please do not forget to bring show and tell.

### **OCTOBER 8, 2005**

**Morning**: *Introduction to Doubleweave*, Eunice Smith

This will cover thoroughly the topic of doubleweave, types of, how to weave, how to do pick-up, basic threadings and setts, and examples from many years of study and collecting. Please bring all your questions about doubleweave.

**Afternoon**: Doubleweave Round Robin

This all-day session will launch our doubleweave study group. We will weave in a "round robin" fashion, so by the end of the day you should have woven 6 items. Please see the webpage for a preview of what you will be weaving.

### **NOVEMBER 5, 2005**

**Morning**: *Lace Weaves*, Laurie Autio (more information to follow)

Afternoon: Kumihimo, Loris Epps

Kumihimo is the Japanese name for the art of cord-making via braiding (Braiding.org) and used for braiding ropes, belts, ribbons and decorative sashes We will use simple looms/stands to learn the basic of braiding, how to move in harmony with one's braiding equipment and discover various types of braiding equipment. This is a handson lecture.

### **DECEMBER 3, 2005**

**All Day:** Surprise project and holiday party

Our annual mid-program year break; this a great time to take a break for the hectic pace of holiday preparation and share laughter, good food, a simple project, and gift swap. The project! It is a surprised and will be lead by Nancy Evans.

### **JANUARY 7, 2006**

**Morning**: Color-and-Weave, Log Cabin and Shadow Weaves, Debbie Palmer

This presentation will outline the definitions, similarities and differences between the weaves, and offer some design considerations for different projects.

**Afternoon**: *Questions and answers, Weaving tips.* Please submit any areas of concern, questions, and any topics needed information to Laura Freeman. The speaker for this session will be announced shortly.

### **FEBRUARY 4, 2006**

Morning: Twills, Karen Wittshirk We will examine making a twill sampler to discover how many different treadlings that can be produced this way. Color will be emphasized color variations. A twill sampler will be shared and members will be encouraged to create one of their own. We will briefly touch upon more than 4 shaft variations.

**Afternoon**: *Southern Counterpanes*, Ute Bargmann

Some time ago we were introduced to some highly sculpted white-on-white Southern counterpanes. Southern manuscripts that were found yielded some rather strange notations. When it came to trying to weave them, results were less than impressive. In using singles cottons and tweaking the techniques, some rather unusual outcomes were achieved. Slide lecture with handouts and lots of samples to touch and a loom to try out the floating warp technique.

### **MARCH 4, 2006**

Morning: Doubleweave Study GroupWrap-up Members will bring a completed item based upon knowledge gained during Doubleweave Study Group.

**Afternoon**: *3-Shaft Patterns*, L. Epps & Ute Bargmann

Less is more. Ute and Loris started on this path of study many years ago independently and then discovered that they were both studying the same technique. Together they have studied historical 3-shafts, developed a workshop, and served as a resource to others venturing into this field of study. The many wonderful effects that can be achieved with only 3-shafts will be discussed as well as the revived interest in this area of weaving. Many samples and drafts will be available for viewing.

**Morning**: *Supplementary Warp*, Ute Bargmann

Ideas on how to achieve woven borders on cloth or weaving a pattern with just one shuttle. There will be instructions on how to draft for this, handouts and at least two threaded looms for you to try the techniques.

**Afternoon**: *Yarns and Textures, Finishing and Hints*, Loris Epps

This lecture will offer many tips and hints about weaving, your loom, and equipment. Information will be provided about wool and cotton (linen was covered in the

spring of 2005). Laura Freeman has volunteered to collect any questions or problem areas of weaving prior to this meeting and Loris will answer during this meeting.

We were busy this year-lots of questions about weaving, where to weave, where to buy supplies and equipment.



### Directions to The Landmark Monastery Heights:

Points North: I-91 South to Exit 13B

(Route 5 South). Pass cinemas on the right, then bear right onto Monastery Avenue. Landmark at Monastery Heights is at the top of the hill on the right.

**Points South:** I-91 North to Exit 3

(Route 5 North). Go through a short tunnel to the next traffic light. McDonald's is on the left. At that light, take a left onto East Elm Street. It will immediately become Elm Street. Follow around the curve to the right and take a left onto Monastery Avenue. We are located at the top of the hill on the right.

**Points West:** Take Route 20 East to the fork at King's Highway. Take left fork at King's Highway. Take a left onto Elm Street. Take left onto Monastery Avenue. Landmark at Monastery Heights will be at the top of hill on the right.

**Points East:** From Mass Pike, take Exit 4. Go through tolls and take first exit immediately after tolls onto Route 5 South. Continue for 1-2 miles. After passing the cinemas, bear right onto Elm Street. Take right onto Monastery Avenue. We are located at the top of the hill on the right.
